

The City Council of the City of Seabrook met in regular session on Tuesday, April 18, 2023 at 6:00 p.m. in Seabrook City Hall, 1700 First Street, Seabrook, Texas, to discuss, consider and if appropriate, take action on the items listed below.

Mayor Kolupski called the meeting to order at 6:01 p.m. and led the audience in the Pledges of Allegiance.

1. PRESENTATIONS

1.1 Presentation by City of Deer Park to recognize City of Seabrook for its assistance with clean up after the January 24, 2023 tornado. *Jerry Mouton, Deer Park Mayor, James J. Stokes, Deer Park City Manager, and Sara Robinson, Deer Park Assistant City Manager*

City of Deer Park officials joined the City of Seabrook City Council by video conference to thank Seabrook for its assistance during the clean up after the January 24, 2023 tornado in Deer Park. Mayor Kolupski was presented with a plaque and a collage of pictures from the clean up activities.

1.2 Presentation of the Saltwater Derby Post Event Report. *Dr. Melissa Everett, Saltwater Derby Committee*

1.3 Presentation of the Annual Public Safety Report. *Bryan Brand, Lieutenant*

Lt. Bryan Brand presented the Annual Public Safety Report show in Attachment B.

2. **PUBLIC COMMENTS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS**

Jennifer Fogarty, 1830 Lakeside Drive, Seabrook, stated that she is interested in quality of life in Seabrook and she wants her home to be a sanctuary. Sound is amplified as it travels across the water, so measuring decibels is not the best option for determining noise. Unwanted sound is noise. Airplanes, jets, and helicopters make noise and Ms. Fogarty chooses not to live near Ellington Field. Harvard University did a study that concluded that chronic noise and noise pollution has an impact on a person's health, including hearing loss, stress, mental health issues, and attention deficit. Unwanted sound accumulates over time. Ms. Fogarty stated that she would like to listen to music that she chooses.

Rober Lamy, 1830 Lakeside Drive, Seabrook, explained that he has been in front of Council multiple times to speak against Barge 295. The hope was that the issue of loud noise coming from the Barge was resolved; however, the noise is still disturbing. Hopefully everyone can come to a resolution soon. There are plenty of businesses that create noise, but people are not at City Council complaining about those businesses. Hopefully legal action will not be required.

Terry Moore, 2709 N. Meyer, Seabrook, stated that he wanted to continue to voice his freedom of speech rights to state that he is looking for ways to move forward with this noise situation with Barge 295. He encouraged all residents to speak up for what they believe is right, especially when/if they feel attacked by other residents, like being call ridiculous in the last Council meeting from Barge supporters. Mr. Moore asked City Council to vote no on the CUP for Barge 295.

Tim Williams, 1805 Larabee, Seabrook, explained that he lives about 40 yards from the stage at Barge 295, and the Barge owners said they wanted to work with the community; however, one week after the last meeting, Mr. Williams was awakened around 11:15pm to screaming. It's a quality of life issue.

Karley Robinson, 104 Shirleen Drive, Pasadena, stated that her family is the owner of Barge 295 and that she likes going to concerts with friends and family there. The family has Christmas in The Yard, and it is very important to keep music open in Seabrook. Ms. Robinson's family would be devastated if the Barge must close. Ms. Robinson stated that she is proud of her Dad and his hard work, and asked City Council to consider allowing Barge 295 to remain open.

Bill Hummel, 4001 Nasa Pkway, El Lago, explained that he has been the General Manager of Barge 295 since July 2022. He stated that the owners and staff want to make the music venue work in Seabrook. During the last concert in The Yard, staff took decibel readings with the Police Department present and the readings were within the requirements of the noise ordinance. There is more noise from cars driving by than from the stage. Owners and staff want to make the location a family fun place.

Matthew Siebenlist, 2106 Willow Dell Drive, Seabrook, stated that at the last meeting, people were talking about the future of Seabrook, but everyone is here, now, and this item either gives live music a home in Seabrook or it doesn't. City Council should keep neighbors and business owners in mind when making their decision. Neighbors and business owners are tax payers. Mitigation means less severe noise. The owners are already taking steps to mitigate the sound levels and we all want people to spend money in Seabrook. Why wouldn't the Council let the Barge owners show everyone that they want to make folks happy? Music helps people heal and cope and the owners want to be held accountable.

Jose Lopez, 2600 Lakeside Terrace, Seabrook, explained that he does not get the notifications of these meetings because he works so much, but he wants everyone to know that when he gets home in the evenings, the music starts. Mr. Lopez's house was built in 1979, so it does not have double pane windows, and the woofers can easily be heard. The language of the songs is not good, and Mr. Lopez does not like it. Drivers from Barge 295 get confused when leaving and drive down Mr. Lopez's street and throw beer bottles in the yard and urinate in the yard. It's disrespectful. Mr. Lopez stated that he will call the police every day, if needed, and that he does not like what is happening.

An affirmative vote of a majority of City Council Members present to reopen the application will automatically send the matter back to the Planning & Zoning Commission for notification to adjacent property owners, for public hearing, and for report and recommendation from Planning & Zoning to Council on approval or denial of the Conditional Use Permit. *Jackie Rasco, Councilmember Position 1*

Motion was made by Councilmember Rasco and seconded by Councilmember Machol to approve the reopening of the application for a Conditional Use Permit to establish a "Music Venue" at 2623 Nasa Rd. 1, as per the Seabrook City Code, Appendix A, Comprehensive Zoning, Article 4, "Special Use Regulations", Section 4.11, "Conditional Use Permit criteria and procedures" and if a majority of City Council Members present vote affirmatively to reopen the application, the application will automatically be sent back to the Planning & Zoning Commission for notification to adjacent property owners, for public hearing, and for report and recommendation from Planning & Zoning to Council on approval or denial of the Conditional Use Permit.

SEABROOK POLICE DEPT. has adopted a detailed written policy on racial profiling. Our policy:

- 1) clearly defines acts constituting racial profiling;
- 2) strictly prohibits peace officers employed by the SEABROOK POLICE DEPT. from engaging in racial profiling;
- 3) implements a process by which an individual may file a complaint with the SEABROOK POLICE DEPT. if the individual believes that a peace officer employed by the SEABROOK POLICE DEPT. has engaged in racial profiling with respect to the individual;
- 4) provides public education relating to the agency's complaint process;
- 5) requires appropriate corrective action to be taken against a peace officer employed by the SEABROOK POLICE DEPT. who, after an investigation, is shown to have engaged in racial profiling in violation of the SEABROOK POLICE DEPT. policy;
- 6) requires collection of information relating to motor vehicle stops in which a warning or citation is issued and to arrests made as a result of those stops, including information relating to:
 - a. the race or ethnicity of the individual detained;
 - b. whether a search was conducted and, if so, whether the individual detained consented to the search;
 - c. whether the peace officer knew the race or ethnicity of the individual detained before detaining that individual;
 - d. whether the peace officer used physical force that resulted in bodily injury during the stop;
 - e. the location of the stop;
 - f. the reason for the stop.
- 7) requires the chief administrator of the agency, regardless of whether the administrator is elected, employed, or appointed, to submit an annual report of the information collected under Subdivision (6) to:
 - a. the Commission on Law Enforcement; and
 - b. the governing body of each county or municipality served by the agency, if the agency is an agency of a county, municipality, or other political subdivision of the state.

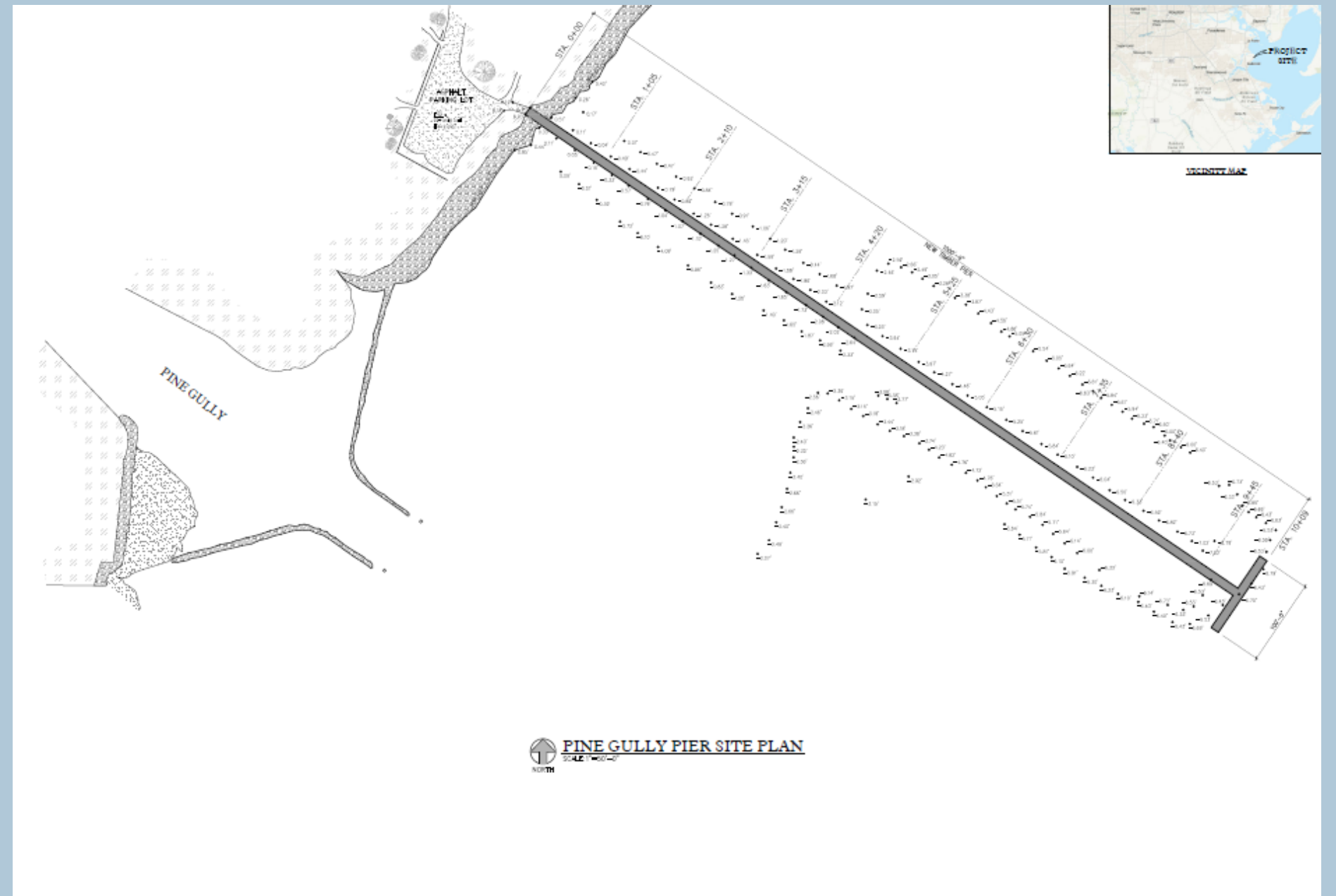

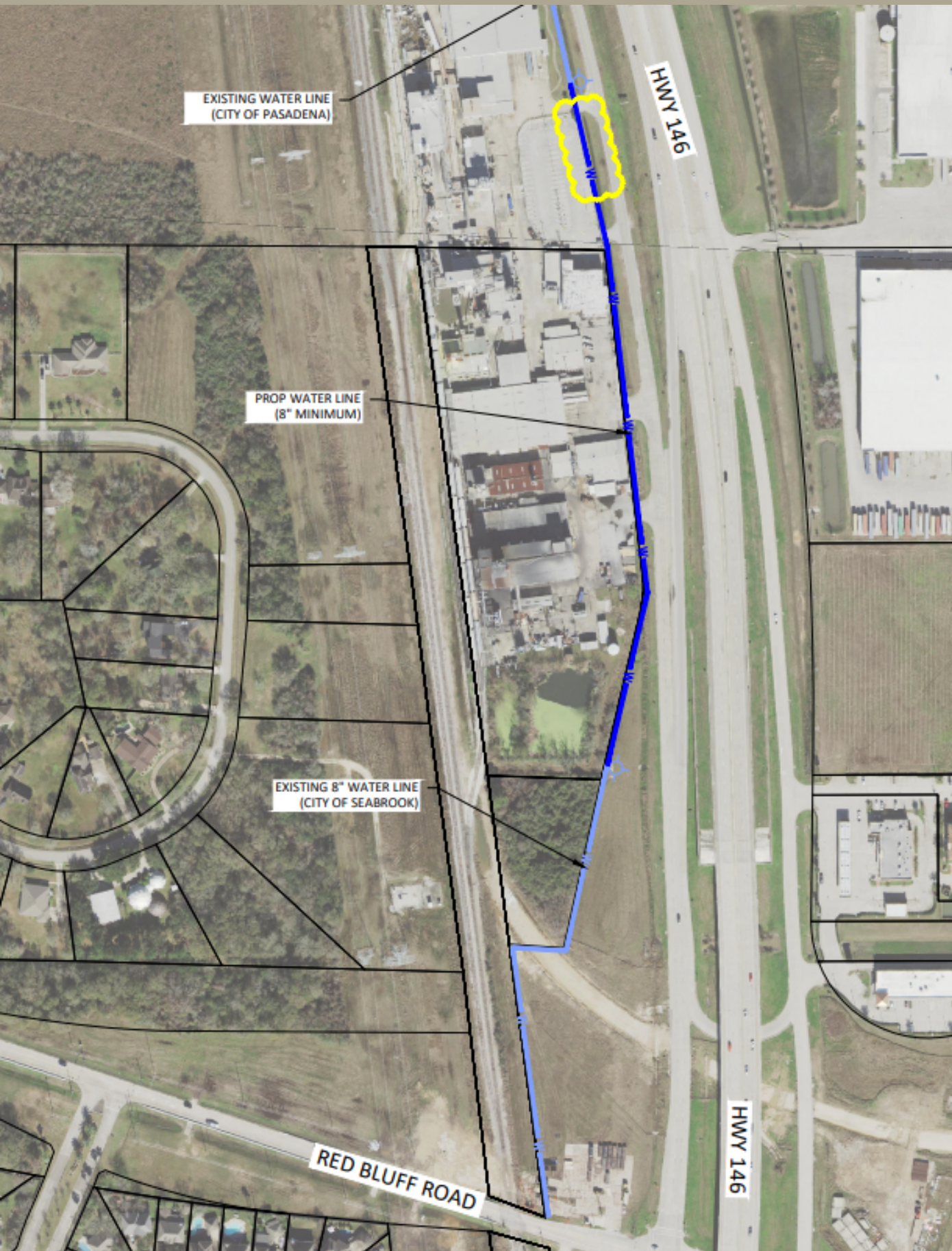

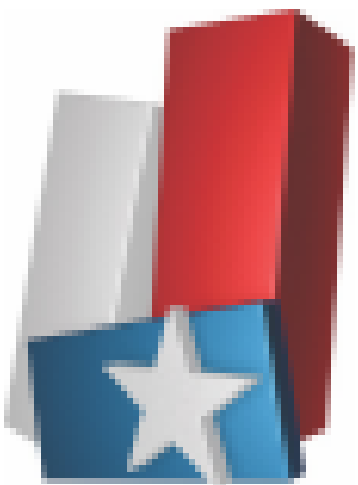

Targeted Preemption

- **H.B. 1750** (Burns) / **H.J.R. 126** and **S.B. 1421** (Perry)
 - Both bills limit city regulation of agricultural operations within the city limits and ETJ. H.B. 1750 passed House; S.B. 1421 passed the Senate.
- **H.B. 2308** (Ashby)
 - Preemption of certain ordinances that regulate agricultural operations. Passed House.
- **H.B. 2239** (Troxclair)
 - City can't prohibit removal of ash juniper tree. Reported from House Land and Resource Management.
- **H.B. 2035** (Slawson) and **S.B. 986** (Creighton)
 - City can't adopt or enforce a regulation that restricts evictions. H.B. 2035 heard in House Business and Industry; S.B. 986 heard in Senate Business and Commerce.
- **H.B. 2367** (Lozano)
 - Preempts city regulation of "residential amenity rentals". Heard in House Land and Resource Management.
- **H.B. 1598** (Darby)
 - Limits city ability to regulate siting of municipal solid waste facilities. Voted from House Environmental Regulation.
