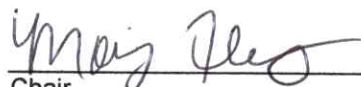

Hearing no further business, Chair Flores adjourned the meeting at 5:46 p.m.

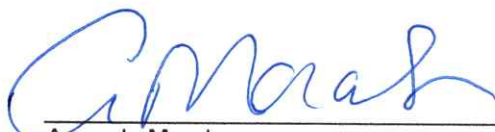

Part 1 Introduction

This document defines the **Hester Garden Park Boy Scout Flower Bed Restoration** as a targeted public park improvement located at **3029 Todville Rd, Seabrook, Texas 77586**, explicitly identifying the existing Boy Scout bed as the restoration focus and establishing the need for corrective intervention due to its current deteriorated condition. The document confirms the working footprint through measured field references, stating that the bed spans approximately **16 feet in one direction and 15 feet in another, with a 240 square foot maximum area**, and visually documents the site through images that show **a single dominant tree with exposed root flare, partial shade from canopy coverage, a sloped grade transitioning toward a gravel pathway, a failed and discontinuous block border, and a defined geometry consisting of a wood-formed 90 degree corner with a curved radius edge opposite it**. These verified physical and dimensional conditions establish the project as a **woodland-edge restoration scenario** rather than a conventional full-sun landscape installation, directly supporting the document's progression into a native plant audit and ecological system design. The introduction therefore positions the project as a **practical, site-driven restoration effort** that integrates structural border correction, soil rehabilitation, and native Gulf Coast plant implementation, while maintaining tree root protection and existing environmental context, ultimately framing the work as a **Boy Scout service project that delivers park improvement, native habitat restoration, and long-term ecological functionality aligned with the documented site conditions**.

Best use: brighter edge pockets and Gulf Coast compatible prairie species. Native American Seed states this mix is adapted to Gulf Coast states and recommended for Gulf Coast Prairies and similar ecoregions.
